## Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

## **Bible context: 1 Samuel**

The book of 1 Samuel was written around 900 BCE by a few authors, including Samuel himself. It was originally a very long scroll which became two separate books (1 and 2 Samuel) in the Bible. The book tells the story of Samuel who was born to Hannah. Hannah prayed for a baby and promised God that if she had a son, she would give him back to God to serve in the tabernacle.

This story helps us to explore what it means to pray to God and wait for the answer.

# The Story: 1 Samuel 1 verses 1-11 and 17-18 (from The International Children's Bible)

There was a man named Elkanah son of Jeroham. He was from Ramathaim in the mountains of Ephraim. Elkanah was from the family of Zuph. (Jeroham was Elihu's son. Elihu was Tohu's son. And Tohu was the son of Zuph from the family group of Ephraim.) Elkanah had two wives. One was named Hannah, and the other was named Peninnah. Peninnah had children, but Hannah had none.

Every year Elkanah left his town Ramah and went up to Shiloh. There he worshiped the Lord of heaven's armies and offered sacrifices to him. Shiloh was where Hophni and Phinehas served as priests of the Lord. They were the sons of Eli. When Elkanah offered sacrifices, he always gave a share of the meat to his wife Peninnah. He also gave shares of the meat to her sons and daughters. But Elkanah always gave a special share of the meat to Hannah. He did this because he loved Hannah and because the Lord had made Hannah unable to have children. Peninnah would upset Hannah and make her feel bad. She did this because the Lord had made Hannah unable to have children. This happened every year when they went up to the Tent of the Lord at Shiloh. Peninnah would upset Hannah until Hannah would cry and not eat anything. Her husband Elkanah would say to her, "Hannah, why are you crying? Why won't you eat? Why are you sad? Don't I mean more to you than ten sons?"

Once, after they had eaten their meal in Shiloh, Hannah got up. Now Eli the priest was sitting on a chair near the entrance to the Lord's Holy Tent. Hannah was very sad. She cried much and prayed to the Lord. She made a promise. She said, "Lord of heaven's armies, see how bad I feel. Remember me! Don't forget me. If you will give me a son, I will give him back to you all his life. And no one will ever use a razor to cut his hair."

Eli answered, "Go in peace. May the God of Israel give you what you asked of him."

Hannah said, "I want to be pleasing to you always." Then she left and ate something. She was not sad anymore.

## Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

## **Prayers and Answers**

In this story we see Hannah praying to God for a son and God answering her prayers. She had waited a long time.

When we pray, do we always get what we ask for?

Sometimes the answer is yes, sometimes it is not yet, wait; sometimes the answer is no and sometimes it can feel that there is no answer at all or that we get something completely different.

Here are a few stories of people who prayed and waited....

Share them together and share your own stories of prayers and answers to prayer.

## Story One – a prayer that was answered with a YES

Nathan was a boy who could not sleep. He usually was a good sleeper, but recently he was waking around mid-night and could not get back to sleep. It was beginning to make him very tired and anxious. He spoke with his Sunday school teacher who told him that she is often still awake at that time. She offered to pray for him every night at midnight, that God would be with him and help him to sleep soundly, and he agreed to pray too. The next Sunday they chatted again. Nathan excitedly said that he had slept through every night that week and was feeling much better. He thanked his Sunday school teacher for praying and thanked God for being with him and helping him to sleep. This continued for a few weeks, until Nathans's sleep pattern was back to normal.

#### Story Two – a prayer that was answered with a not yet, wait

Stacey and her brother used to be very close. But the family had a fall out and Stacey hadn't seen her brother for many years. She missed him terribly and prayed for him often, asking God to bring him back into her life again. Many years went by (over 20 in total) with Stacey praying to see her brother again. She felt that God was saying it will happen, be patient. After over 20 years of praying and waiting, Stacey's brother made contact. He was getting married and wanted her to be there. What a wonderful day it was! Many years of waiting and praying; now they were brother and sister, together again.

## Story Three – a prayer that was answered with a No

Jem had to move back in with her parents while she saved to get a mortgage. She had everything sorted, she prayed for a mortgage so that she could live nearby her parents and was met with a firm no. Application for mortgage declined. She didn't understand why, until a few months later when she got a job and moved to a totally different area, following God. If she had got the mortgage, she never would have moved away and would have missed the most memorable time of her life.






## Story Four – a prayer that was answered not as expected



Instead, she was offered a job of cleaning the church kitchens and toilets each week. It gave her a regular income and was pretty well paid; not the answer she wanted (she didn't enjoy scrubbing loos) or expected but was way better.

- o Do you think that Hannah believed her prayer for a son would be answered? Why did she promise to give him back to the temple if she wanted a son so much?
- Have you ever made a bargain/deal with God? Can we persuade God to do things by making promises?
- What are the things that you most want to have/see in life? What are the things you always pray for?

# **Pray Together**

## Flag Prayers



You will need rectangles of scrap material or plain paper, scissors, pegs and a pen. Choose a 'Big Problem' to pray about. Make an image for your prayer flag (will you use paint, rubbish, stickers, stamps, pens?). Add words if you want to. Peg your flags on the washing line or on a piece of string.





## **House Prayers**



Choose someone you would like to pray for this week.



Draw their house and then cut it out.

Put it on your fridge, by your bed or on a door to remind you to pray for them every day this week.

## **Swaddling Prayers**

Swaddling is a way of making a baby feel safe and comforted by wrapping them in material that feels as though they are being hugged. In Bible times, babies were often wrapped like this.

Use a doll or a teddy and a long piece of material or a scarf.

Each time you wrap the material around the doll, pray for a different age group in your church family.

- 1. Babies
- 2. Children
- 3. Young people
- 4. Adults
- 5. Older people

Cuddle the doll and thank God for loving everyone!

## To Do Together...

## **Prayer Stars**

**You will need:** Six sticks the same size

Small elastic bands/string

Tissue paper and glue/water mix - optional




## What you do:




Create a star using sticks or pencils by making two triangles and joining them with either elastic bands or string.

If you want to create a solid star, layer two tissues on either side of the star and gently paint them with a mixture of half water half glue, leave it to dry overnight and then trim it. You can then write your prayer on it.

**Blow Away Art** 

**You will need:** Gather some things you find outside



## What you do:

Create an image from the things you have found and then let the wind blow it away.

Sometimes we have to let go of things and let the wind of the spirit take it and let it be heard.

We then need to wait for an answer, it may be yes, it may be no, it may be something different and unexpected just like our stories today.









# Walking the Way Challenge this time is...

Everyday Faith:

Create a table for the week, perhaps one like this:

Mon	Tues	Wed	Thurs	Fri	Sat	Sun

Hannah kept her promise to God. She said that if God were to give her a baby, she would dedicate it back to God and she did.

As a family, think of something that you could all promise to do, write one thing for each day, it could be tidying something, being kind to someone, reading your Bible. Whatever you chose, you need to try really hard to keep that promise and encourage each other to stick to it. Each time you manage to keep that promise, tick it off your table. If you enjoyed doing it for a week, you could extend it for longer.... I wonder how long you could keep it up for?

## Scrapbooking:

Hannah named her child Samuel, which means 'Heard of God'. In your scrapbook, use your best pens, crayons to write and decorate your name. Find out what your name means and write that in too. Alternatively, you could print out what it means and stick it in your book.

Take it Further:
