Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

You could print this out once and colour each new book on the bookshelf as you read stories from it.







Bible context: Mark

The book of Mark was written around 60 AD by Mark who was thought to be a friend of Peter, who then travelled with Paul and Barnabas. Mark's book begins at the start of Jesus ministry as an adult. Jesus travels, telling stories and performing miracles for ordinary people and makes it very clear that God's love is not just for a few people who are in charge, it is for everyone!

This week's story helps us to remember that we all belong with Jesus, even if others don't seem welcoming or we find it hard to believe ourselves.

The Story: Mark 2 verses 13-17 (from The International Children's Bible)

Jesus went to the lake again. A crowd followed him there, and he taught them. While he was walking beside the lake, he saw a tax collector named Levi son of Alphaeus. Levi was sitting in the tax office. Jesus said to him, "Follow me". And Levi stood up and followed Jesus.

Later that day, Jesus ate at Levi's house. There were many tax collectors and "sinners" eating there with Jesus and his followers. Many people like this followed Jesus. The teachers of the law who were Pharisees saw Jesus eating with the tax collectors and "sinners". They asked his followers, "Why does he eat with tax collectors and 'sinners'?"

Jesus heard this and said to them, "Healthy people don't need a doctor. It is the sick who need a doctor. I did not come to invite good people. I came to invite sinners."

Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

These activities are designed to enable you as a family to explore where we belong and why.

Explore The Scene

Create the story scene, perhaps by drawing it or making it as a 3 D model, and place it in the middle of your space or table. Now take some time to look at the story and wonder together. These prompts might help:

Who are you in the story, who do you relate to the most and why?

What do you think each person in the scene is feeling /thinking?

What do you see happening in this scene, that the words of the story might not show us?

Who is this story about? Who are the main characters?

Who are the people that belong at this table? Who doesn't belong and why?

You could add to your scene over the week or during your discussions, adding thought and speech bubbles and so on.

Act it Out

Using role play is a good way of exploring the emotions and thoughts of the people in the scene. Allocate the roles and have some fun recreating the scene. You don't have to stay true to the words in the bible. I wonder what this story would look like if we bought it into the modern day?

Table Top Discussions

Each day over a mealtime, have a quick conversation. Here are a few questions to get you going.

- Who are the people you are sitting with each day?
- o How do we welcome people into the groups we belong to?
- o Do you feel you belong, where do you feel you belong?
- o When and how do we exclude people without meaning to?
- o What do you think this story is teaching us about Jesus and about ourselves?

Use a box or a bag to hold the treasures and encourage any little ones to explore what's in the box/bag each week to go with the Bible story.






Two toys to represent

Pray Together

Woven Heart

You will need: A heart cut from card

Different textures: wool, paper, ribbon, feathers, material, sandpaper etc




Cut a heart out of card and make holes around the edge. Thread string across the heart to make a web. Cut lengths of different colours and

textures. Strong, rough, shiny, soft, colourful,...

Take the strips of different textures and think about how they make you feel or perhaps who they make you think of. Slowly weave the different textures through the heart. You could write the name of people you want to pray for on a strip of paper and thread that through the heart. As you do, this take some time to reflect on how each of us are loved and are part of God's family.

Find a brick or a stone, button ... that represents you and place it in the palm of your hand. Know that God holds you in the palm of his hand. Think about all the people that are part of your life, people that support and encourage and help you to feel you belong. As you think of them, close your hand around the stone. Name the person you are thinking of and say thank you to God for them.

Mixed Media Collage

You will need: Some junk

A large sheet of cardboard (from a cardboard box)


What you do:

Using all the different things you have collected, create a collage picture. If you wish, you could paint it afterwards or just leave it as it is. You don't have to stick everything down, maybe create a picture and then make a different one. How many different pictures can you make with the same objects I wonder?



Touch and feel the different media, how they work together, and how they all sound and feel different.

Who are you sitting with and how do we all work together to make something amazing?









To Do Together...



Handprint Pictures

You will need: Old pieces of paper

A large sheet of paper A pencil and scissors



What you do:

Ask people in your home, and visitors who come into your home, (if you are in church, why not ask everyone in church?) to draw round their hand. They could use any brightly coloured paper or could decorate their paper themselves.

Cut the handprints out and create a picture using all of them in some way. A butterfly? A tree? Something else? Use your imagination but remember not to leave anyone out.



We are each unique but together we are a masterpiece. Jesus doesn't want everyone to be the same, that is why he asked people from different backgrounds to follow him. We can all still be uniquely us but together we create God's masterpiece.









To Do Together...

Block Pictures

You will need: A colouring picture

A range of –

colouring pens, pencils and crayons

Sellotape



What you do:



Choose a colouring picture and cut it up into difference sections.

Each take a section to colour. Use your own choice of pens, pencils, or crayons – you don't have to match with the person colouring the section next to yours. Your section will be uniquely yours.



When all the sections are coloured, put your picture back together.



In our story, we hear that it doesn't matter what we are like or who we are, we all have our place in God's picture – we all belong to God. All of the people Jesus called to follow him are very different but all have something to add to the whole picture, even tax collectors.

Who do you think Jesus would choose to have tea with nowadays?

Scrapbooking:

On a piece of paper, draw bubbles to represent every group or setting where you belong. Maybe your school and class or your workplace, your groups of friends, clubs you belong to, your church etc. You could write or draw in each of the bubbles to show what they represent. Then draw a big circle round the outside of all the bubbles. This one represents the family of God. Maybe you could colour all the space inside that bubble in a bright colour that surrounds each of the smaller bubbles.

Take it Further:

Lots of different groups of people suffer loneliness and isolation and find it hard to find ways to feel they belong. Find out what charities in your neighbourhood support people who are lonely or isolated. Maybe your church has a project you could support, or perhaps you could suggest one.
