Get to know your Bible

The Bible is like a library made up of 66 books written by many different people over many years.

The Old Testament books were written before Jesus was born. They are the holy stories he would have grown up hearing and reading. There are 39 of these.

The New Testament tells us the stories of Jesus and his followers. There are 27 books in the


New Testament.

Bible context: Matthew

Matthew is the first book of the New Testament. It shares the good news about Jesus, starting with His family tree. It tells us about Jesus' teaching, His journeys and His stories.

Jesus used stories to help people to think about God. He often used everyday objects, jobs or situations to make His message really clear to the people He was talking to. This week's story takes place at a wedding.

The Story: Matthew 25 verses 1 - 13 (from The International Children's Bible)

"At that time the kingdom of heaven will be like ten girls who went to wait for the bridegroom. They took their lamps with them. Five of the girls were foolish and five were wise. The five foolish girls took their lamps, but they did not take more oil for the lamps to burn. The wise girls took their lamps and more oil in jars. The bridegroom was very late. All the girls became sleepy and went to sleep.

"At midnight someone cried out, 'The bridegroom is coming! Come and meet him!' Then all the girls woke up and got their lamps ready. But the foolish girls said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil. Our lamps are going out'. The wise girls answered, 'No! The oil we have might not be enough for all of us. Go to the people who sell oil and buy some for yourselves'.

"So the five foolish girls went to buy oil. While they were gone, the bridegroom came. The girls who were ready went in with the bridegroom to the wedding feast. Then the door was closed and locked.

"Later the others came back. They called, 'Sir, sir, open the door to let us in'. But the bridegroom answered, 'I tell you the truth, I don't know you'.

"So always be ready. You don't know the day or time the Son of Man will come."

Ideas to Retell/Explore the Story

Here is a new story to share together which helps us think about different ways that we can be ready.......

Rosie's Bag

Rosie's bag was beautiful. It was green, it was fluffy and someone had sewn shiny buttons on it. Rosie never went anywhere without it.

People liked to ask her what was in it, but that was her secret. Besides, she never packed the same things twice – every day was different! She didn't greedily stuff it with sweets or cram it with games to stop her getting bored. It wasn't full of books to read or homework to finish. Every morning she'd stop and think until she knew just what she might need.

One day, she'd decided on a pencil and a folded bag. They were both very useful when they went to the supermarket and Dad realised he'd forgotten shopping bags and something to tick items off his shopping list.

Another day, she packed a slice of stale bread (which she shared with the hungry ducks at the park) and bubbles (which stopped a passing baby from crying straight away).

But one day, she forgot her fluffy green bag. They'd gone too far to go back for it. There was nothing she could do but feel sad and grumpy.

What if someone needed a paperclip or a biscuit or the cheery picture of a sunshine that she'd cut out of grandpa's old magazine?

The walk to school was horrible.

She couldn't smile at their neighbour's dog and his little stripy raincoat, she couldn't enjoy the squirrels leaping whilst trying not to drop their precious acorns and she refused to join in with eyespy, even when she knew the answers. She just knew it was going to be a terrible day.

Archie didn't have a green bag, but he did like to be ready for anything.


As soon as Rosie arrived at school, he knew something was wrong. He asked if she was ok and listened as she told him everything. Then they made a new plan for the day together.


Modern Parables – books that explore the same theme

Table Top Discussions

Each day over a mealtime, have a quick conversation. Here are a few questions to get you going.

- What things are easy to wait for and what things are hard?
- O Who is the best person at waiting in your family?
- o Who likes to be prepared?
- o How does it feel to miss out on something?

Thinking about the characters....

- o The wise girls
- The foolish girls
- o The bridegroom
- The wedding guests

Think about each of the characters in the story and how they felt at the beginning, in the middle and at the end of the story. Would they do things differently at the next wedding they go to?

Something with rainbow colours for God's promise



Pray Together

Attitude Prayer

When we go out on a journey or to work, nursery or school, we often get a bag ready to take with us so we've got all the things we might need. This prayer is about making sure we pack the right attitudes too, so we can do what God asks us, no matter what it might be. It's about being prepared.



You might want to get a bag to put some things in to symbolise what attitudes you want to pack, or you might want to draw the things or write the words. You don't need to use our ideas – have some ideas of your own.



Gentleness – Jesus, help us to be gentle when we meet someone who needs looking after.

(plasters)

Kindness – Jesus, help us to be kind and comfort people who are sad. (tissues)

Generosity – Jesus, help us to be generous when we see people who are in need. (a heart)

Care – Jesus, help us to take care of your creation (the world)

Joy – Jesus, help us to spread your good news everywhere we go (a smile)

Faithfulness – Jesus, help us to be strong when we're tempted to forget you (a cross)

Hope – Jesus, help us to trust that you're always with us and that God's promises are

always true, even when we are not sure (a rainbow)

Wisdom – Jesus, help us to make good choices in all we say and do (a light)

As you put each thing in the bag, say this prayer together.

Help us to be ready

To live, love and be joyful in your presence.

Thank you for your love

Pray Together

Planning Payers

You will need: Circle of strong card or a paper plate

A card arrow to act as a pointer for the circle

Paper fastener





Fasten the pointer to the centre of the card circle using the paper fastener. Around the edge write these words: today, tomorrow, next

week, next month, next year.

We want always to be wise and prepared like the girls who had plenty of oil for their lamps. Move the pointer around the circle and talk to God about what might be happening today, tomorrow etc. Ask God to help you be prepared and make good decisions.

May his love be our oil, burning brightly



To Do Together...



Jar Lamps

You will need: Jam jar

A tealight candle

Or A jam jar with a lid A shoelace or string Vegetable oil

What you do:

Decorate your jar.



You could use a heart-shaped template to cover the glass and then spread glue and glitter over the glass before removing the template to leave the shape of the heart on the glass. Or you could use Sharpies or glass pens to draw or colour the glass. You could stick coloured tissue paper or sweet wrappers on the outside of the glass. Or maybe you've got your own ideas to make it look amazing.

When you have finished, place a tea light inside to create a beautiful lamp.



Punch a hole in the lid of your jam jar. (An adult will need to help you with this)

Using an old shoe lace or string as a wick, cut it to double the length of the jar and cut off the plastic ends.

Thread it through the hole you have punched in the jar lid so that just a little sticks out at the top. To hold it in place, gently press together the flaps created when you made the hole, which makes it secure.











Fill your jar with oil and put your lid on, then carefully trim the wick so that it's the right length. The wick will soak up a little of the oil and will keep soaking up a little more as it burns.

You now have a beautiful oil lamp. (Remember that it is dangerous to play with fire so you must only do this with an adult)

Think of our story. The bridesmaids needed to be prepared to meet the bridegroom whenever he appeared so they had to make sure they had enough oil to last, regardless of how long they had to wait.







To Do Together...

Small World Play

You will need: Ten dolls, teddies or Lego figures for the bridesmaids

A doll, teddy or Lego figure for the bridegroom

What you do:

Replay the story using your figures.

Who are the five that are prepared, and who are not prepared? Can you act out the story with your toys?

I wonder where the bride might have been. How is this wedding different to ones you have seen, heard about or been to?

















To Do Together...





Lamps

Our reading today encourages us to always be ready to display the love of God to all we meet and always be willing to offer the love shared with us all to everyone.

You will need:

Paper, card (recycled is fine), scissors, colouring pens, glue.

Lamp 1 Method: Using the template suggested or design one that works for you.





Colour your lamp, stick to card and carefully cut out; you may need a grown up to help you.







Fold as shown and glue and stick the lamp together. You could add your own images to the panels if you wish. This could be hung up as a reminder to the passage and what God asks of us.

Lamp 2 Method:








If you are younger or wish to make a simpler lamp that is great too! Using a A4 sheet of paper, fold in half and cut as shown leaving a 2 cm strip at the top to form your top and bottom of your lamp.

Decorate and add colour. You now have a reminder that God wants us to be like lamps that are ready and shine brightly for him.







Our Walking the Way Challenge this time is...

This week's story is all about being ready. And waiting patiently for God to ask you to do something. Of course, if we're going to be ready to hear God's voice, we need to listen. The Holy Spirit helps us to listen to God, so each morning this week, let's ask the Holy Spirit to help us be ready to hear God speaking to us and asking us to say yes.

Everyday Faith:

Scrapbooking:

A bridesmaid, page boy or usher at a wedding helps the bride or groom with anything that they need to make the day go smoothly. They keep their eyes open for anything they need to do without being asked. Why not cut out a picture of your face from a photo and then design an outfit, or cut one from a magazine, and put your face as though you're wearing the outfit. Then think about what you might write about being ready to serve God or Jesus.

Take it Further:

Jesus uses a story about a wedding to help us understand his message that it's important to be ready for God. Our "take it further" challenge this week is about weddings. In some countries girls are made to get married very young. We can support them by learning about them and praying for them, and sharing information with others. If we have a little money to spare, we can give to charities like Save the Children and others who work in those countries to help girls stay in education and have more choices about who, when and if they marry. https://www.savethechildren.org/us/charity-stories/child-marriage-a-violation-of-child-rights
